State of Ohio Orders, Restrictions, and Advisories

- Dr. Acton executed a Health Order directing all Ohioans to Stay at Home effective from 11:59 p.m. on Monday, March 23rd through May 1st, (copy of order can be found at coronavirus.ohio.gov)
- Governor DeWine recommends all Ohio residents suspend vacation travel
- The Primary Election in the State of Ohio has been postponed until April 28, 2020
- All K-12 schools are ordered closed effective, Monday, March 16, 2020 through May 1, 2020
 - The school closure order does not currently apply to Ohio's childcare system, such as daycare centers and home-based childcare providers

Actions Taken to Date

- Governor DeWine has signed an Executive Order providing immediate unemployment benefits to all workers that do not have access to paid leave from an employer
- State of Ohio approved for the Economic Injury Disaster Loan Program through the U.S. Small Business Administration
- Established a single website to provide local information on community guidance to include testing protocols, resources, and closures and modifications to service delivery (<https://lucascountyhealth.com/coronavirusupdates/>)
- Established Lucas County Community COVID-19 Call Line, a 24/7 centralized phone number for the public to receive answers to clinical questions related to COVID-19

- A Donations Management System and Center has been established to accept and distribute donations
 - Established a landing page to direct donors to the appropriate place to provide their donation – Volunteer, Food, Financial Assistance, Goods (dontateTLC.org)
 - Linked this through our Health Department Coronavirus page as well
 - All donations of goods should be emailed to Donations@co.lucas.oh.us
 - Toledo Community Foundation is accepting financial donations to support the response to COVID-19
 - United Way is coordinating food donations and volunteers

Situational Awareness*

****New items are in red.***

- Updated modeling projects hospitalizations per day associated with COVID-19 will peak on April 29th at 84 new admissions per day.
- In alignment with the CDC and the Ohio Department of Health, the Toledo-Lucas County Health Department moved effective on Thursday, April 9th to a new reporting model. In this model, the Health Department will be reporting confirmed cases, probable cases and deaths attributed to COVID-19. The Toledo-Lucas County Health Department will begin expanding its tracing capacity through utilization of the Medical Reserve Corps and University of Toledo public health students.
- As of today, the Lucas County EOC is not aware of any Lucas County hospitals accepting COVID patients from Michigan.
- On Friday, April 10th the HMAC voted that the ACF will house overflow of convalescing COVID positive patients. Mercy will provide staffing, personal protective equipment, patient food, and transportation between hospitals and ACF. Promedica will support the planning effort. The trigger point for the ACF will be complete occupancy of all hospitals in the region. All hospitals will participate inter-hospital transfers and internal surge prior to utilization of the ACF. The preference will always be for care to be provided in a hospital setting and utilize the ACF as a resource of last resort.
- On Saturday, April 12th, the Governor's Office reached out to the Northwest Ohio HMAC asking if the region would consider postponing build-out of the ACF but continue planning. The HMAC voted unanimously to support the State's request with the following conditions: 1. Licensing Agreement with the SeaGate Center operator (ASM Global) is still executed but an Implementation Clause added; 2. Contract with the build-out contractor (Rudolph Libbe) is still executed and design completed now; and 3. Governor message the change. This would allow our region to be prepared to operationalize the ACF in 14 days. As of this morning, the Northwest Ohio HMAC has not received a response back from the State.

- The Ohio Controlling Board is expected to review the Licensing Agreement with the SeaGate Convention Center operator (ASM Global) and the ACF build-out contractor (Rudolph Libbe) agreement at their meeting today, April 13th.
- A non-congregate sheltering resource for first responders, health care workers, and the unhoused in isolation or quarantine is operational. There are currently two individuals in the non-congregate shelter. In order to protect the privacy of these individuals, the location of the shelter will not be publicly disseminated.
- A non-congregate sheltering resource for first responders, health care workers, and the unhoused in isolation or quarantine is operational. There are currently two individuals in the non-congregate shelter. In order to protect the privacy of these individuals, the location of the shelter will not be publicly disseminated.
- A sheltering resource for first responders not in isolation or quarantine but needing housing has been established effective at 8 a.m. on Monday, April 6th. Currently, there are **two** first responders in this semi-congregate shelter.
- A committee is forming today, April 13th, to identify the most effective funding source for a countywide COVID-19 Community Antibody Sero Survey
- ESF-15 Public Information has engaged additional community partners to expand public messaging for socially vulnerable populations.

- Determined status of food needs and existing distributions systems within Lucas County
- Identified on-site coordinators for non-congregate sheltering
- Identified Access and Functional Needs point of contact

The following significant resource needs and information requests are outstanding:

- Numerous PPE requests
- Temporal thermometers
- Identify resources available for Rapid Testing for First Responders
- Identify food distribution providers actively enrolling SNAP eligible beneficiaries
- **Identify best practices for building security screenings**

Incident Objectives

Daily Objectives

- Establish Incident Action Plan by 1000 hours
- Distribute Situation Report to organizations
- Provide daily media availability at 1530 hours
- Encourage and support all organizations to plan and operate their own incident command branches and feed into the EOC via appropriate Liaison or ESF desk

- Receive, respond and fulfil resource need requests provided to the EOC
- Facilitate communication amongst all organizations
- Align and consolidate as best possible all public information through the Public Information Liaison
- Ensure accessibility of COVID-19 guidance to all Lucas County residents

The following objectives have been recently completed:

- Distributed information regarding application for FEMA Public Assistance for governments, hospitals, and non-profit organizations
- Established protocol for government offices, businesses, etc. for how to handle a positive COVID-19 case among their workforce, including contact and cleaning guidance.
- **Researched funding mechanisms for large-scale public COVID-19 testing**

Our top objectives for the next planning period are projected as:

- **Assemble a COVID-19 testing and community survey grant committee**
- **Garner a response from the State of Ohio regarding ACF planning and implementation.**
- Establish agreement between the State of Ohio and Lucas County for alternative care facility utilization
- Execute agreement for wraparound services associated with ACF
- Identify transportation resources for COVID-19 positive dialysis patients

The following other objectives have been identified:

- Address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on communities of social vulnerability
- Support resource needs of the Board of Elections related to primary election
- Discuss the status of mental health resources in Lucas County
- Support the needs of persons with access and functional needs
- Develop implementation plan for Rapid Testing of First Responders and Healthcare Workers
- Begin recovery planning process
